

Discover Whittlesey's history in this Museum originally built in 1825 to house the town's horse-drawn fire engines. Explore Fen life and economy from ancient times. See important archaeological finds such as the hoard of Bronze Age axes from Eldernell. Exhibits are included on thatching, celery pricking and the brick industry. There are reconstructed wheelwright's and cobbler's benches, room reconstructions, information on the workhouse and much, much more.

Step back in time and enjoy the atmosphere and displays in this unique, Victorian treasure house. Purpose-built in 1847, the museum has original display cases and features an exotic mix of local and worldwide collections including art, archaeology, a small but significant Ancient

Egyptian collection, natural history, social history and more. There are two reference libraries and a substantial archive.

Discover the ancient market town of Chatteris from earliest prehistoric settlement to recent times in this museum which is currently being refurbished. Visitors can view a wealth of unusual



objects including travelling stocks from 1774, an early "bone shaker" bicycle and a pair of collecting poles. Displays chart developments from the Stone Age through Roman, Norman and Medieval periods up to the 19th century. Further exhibits illustrate traditional aspects of Fenland life.



The Museum's archive contains over 2000 photographs and documents.
Research facilities are available.

March Museum offers something for everyone with its wide-ranging collections reflecting former life in the area, especially over the last hundred years. Late Victorian kitchen, parlour and nursery rooms have been reconstructed and a working Blacksmith's forge has been rebuilt in the courtyard along with a Fenland cottage. Displays examine the Fenland landscape and economy; the many Roman sites in the area; and heroic March train driver, Ben Gimbert GC who saved the town of Soham from destruction following a fire on his ammunition train.



There is a good local archive including photographs. Personal researchers are always welcome.

The Birthplace House is on the banks of the River Nene in the centre of the Fenland market town of Wisbech and occupies part of the attractive Georgian Grade II* listed building in which Octavia Hill, inspirational co-founder of the National Trust and fearless pioneer of social housing, was born in 1838.



The displays commemorate and record the life and work of Octavia Hill, her family and fellow workers. It also marks the work

of those who continue her work today. Exhibition areas contain lively displays and the basement houses a reconstruction of a grim Victorian slum home.
